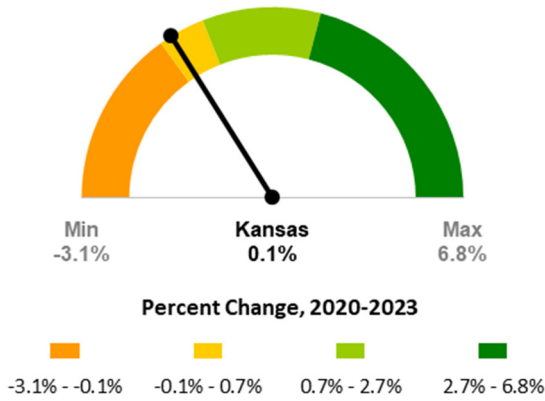

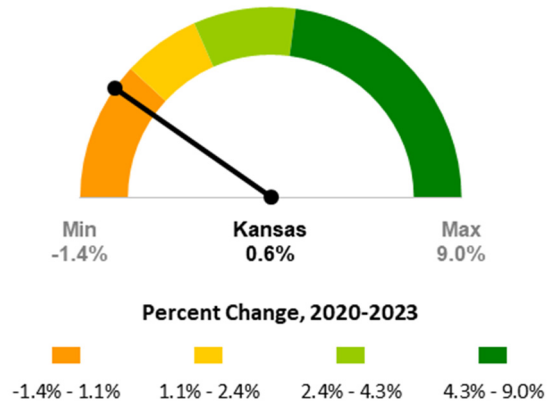

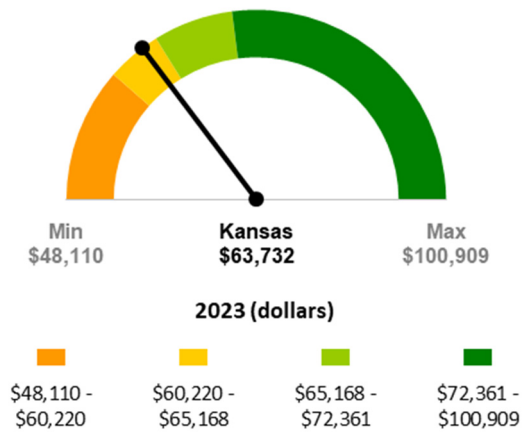
## Population Change



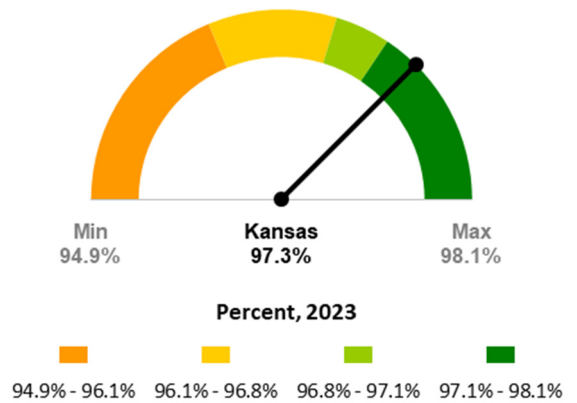
## Labor Force Growth



## Per Capita Personal Income

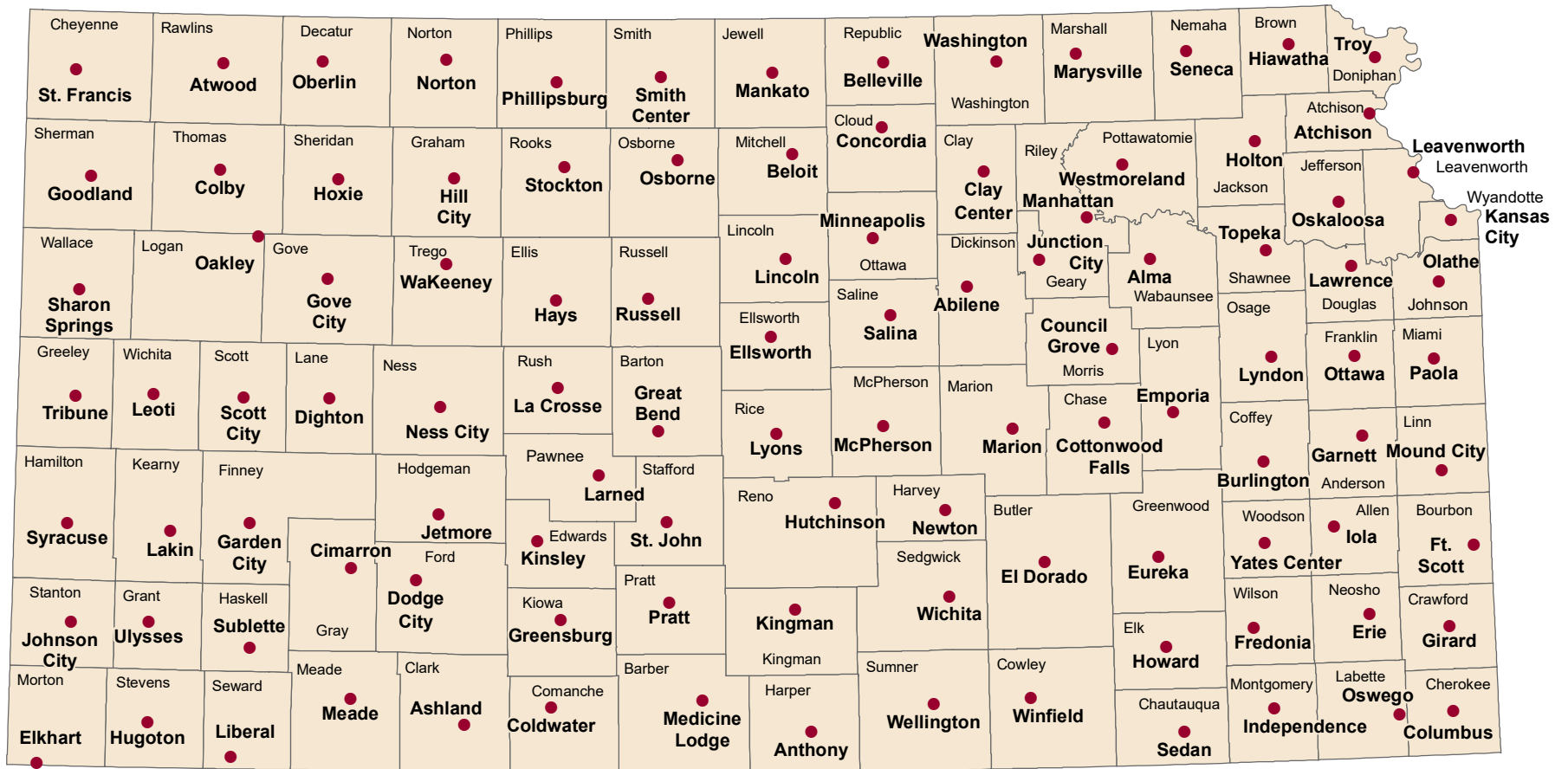

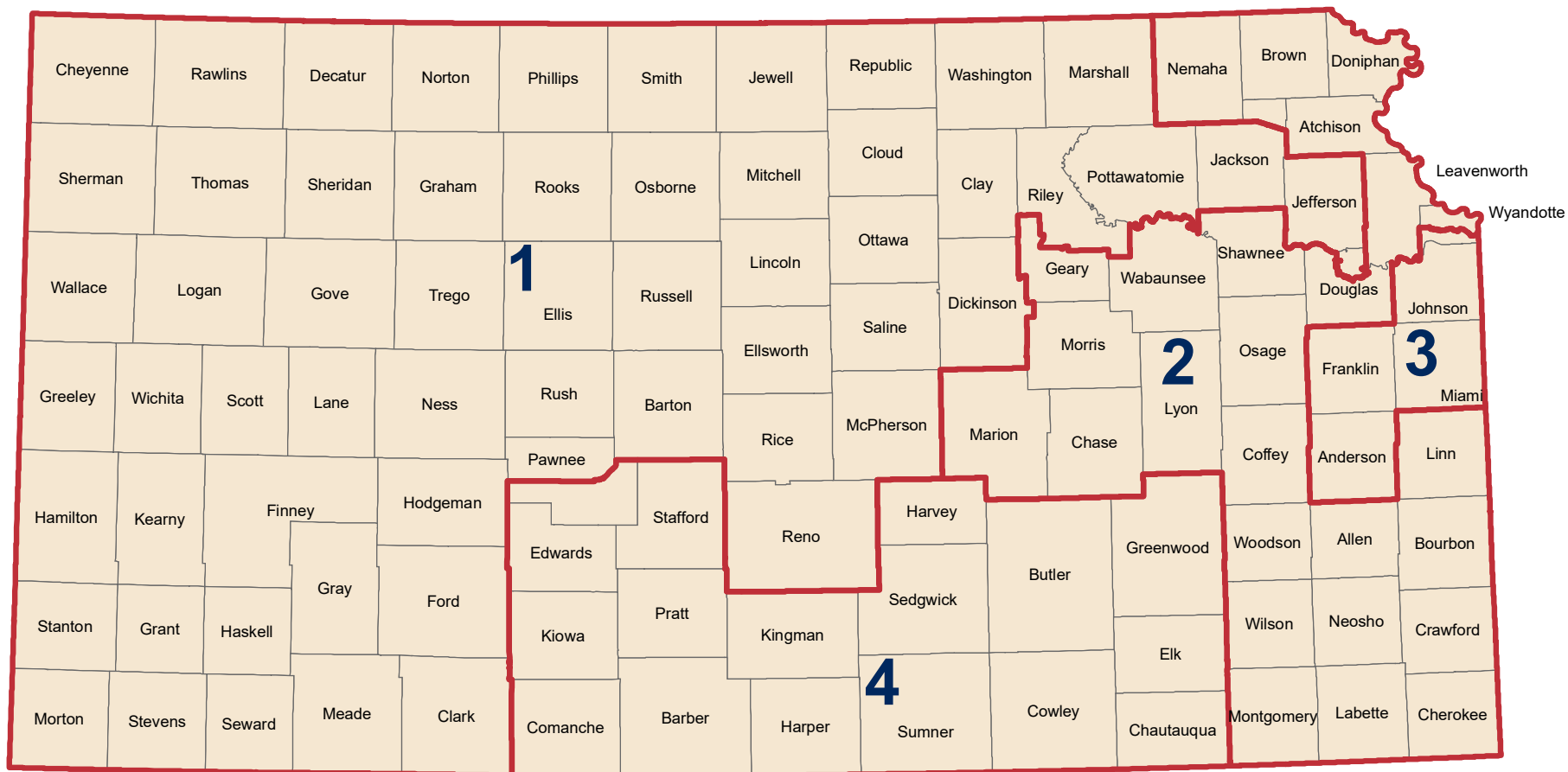

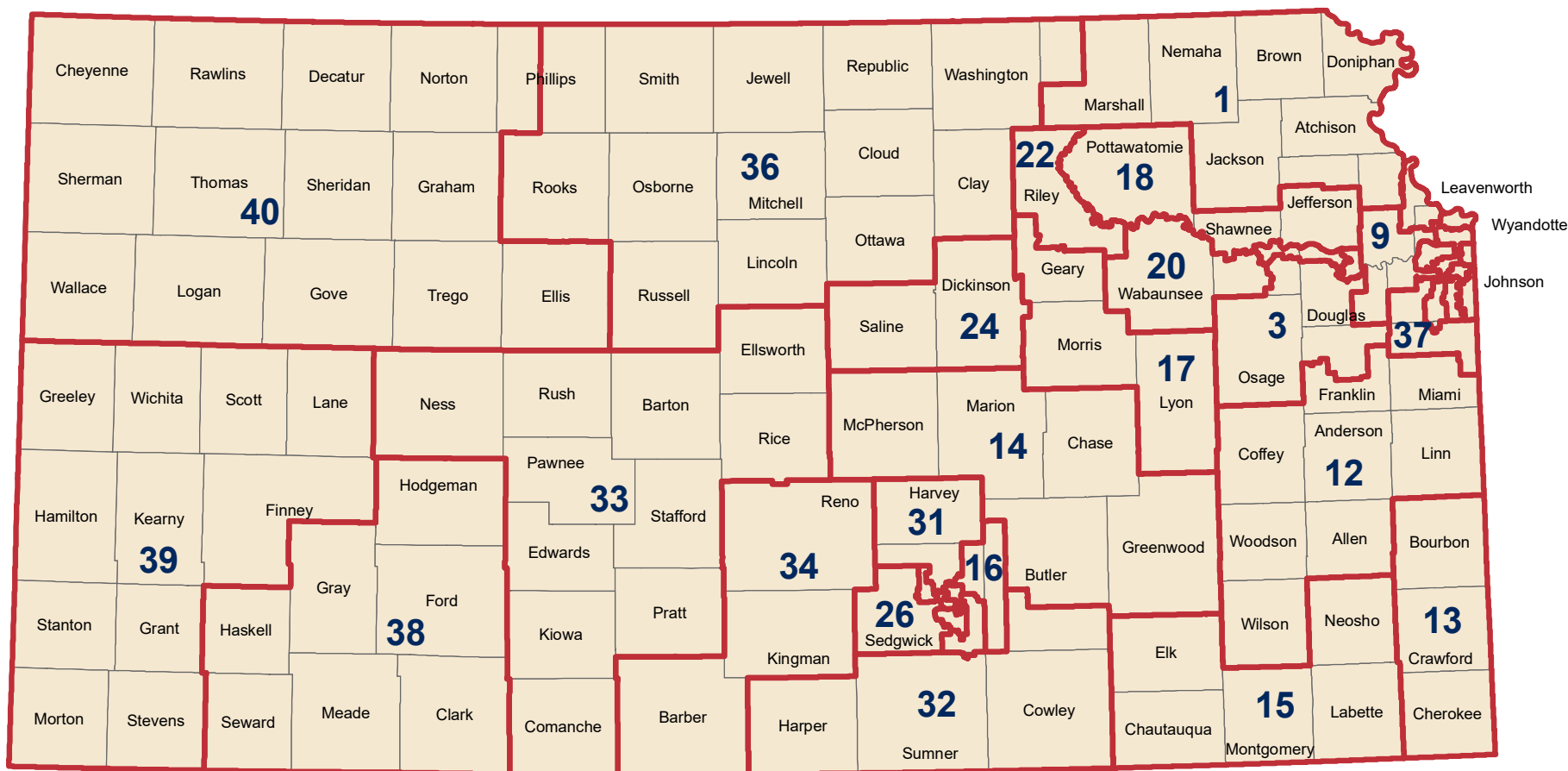
## U.S. Congressional Districts in Kansas, 2022

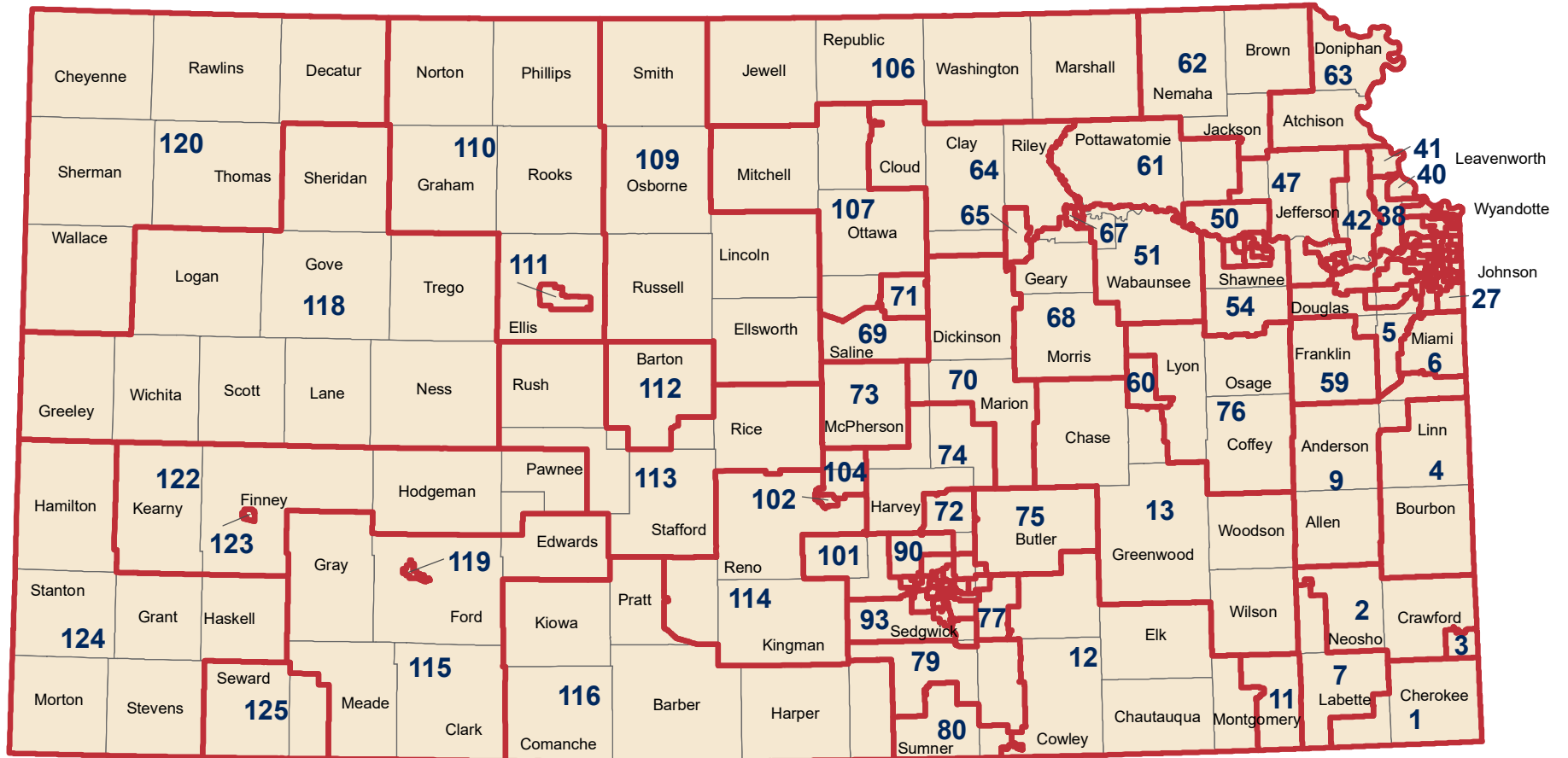
## Kansas Senate Districts, 2022

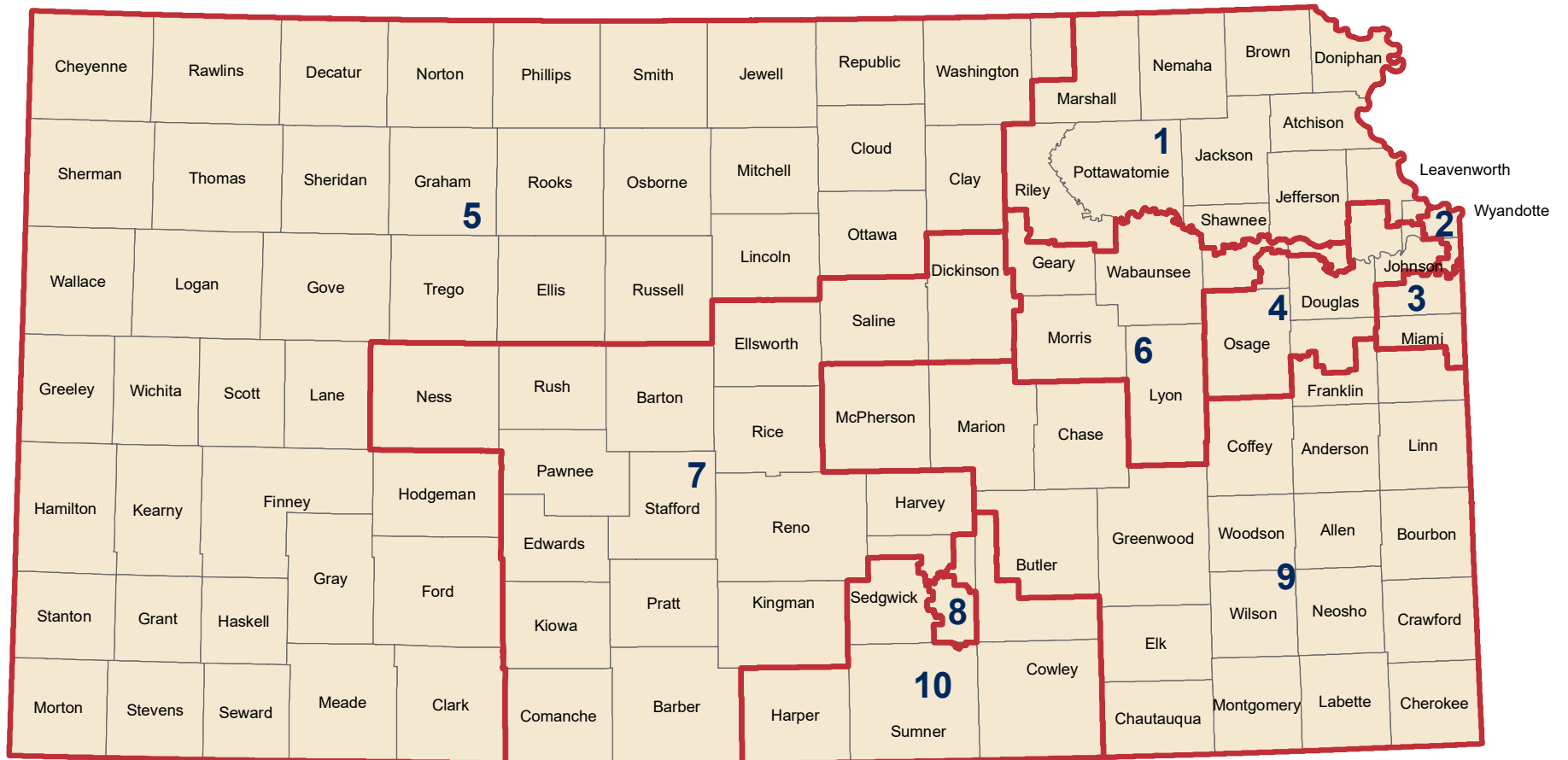
